

Mothers Day—From where to where?

The idea of the original Mother's Day is not what is celebrated today— not even close!

The idea first came from Ann Reeves Jarvis of West Virginia with the "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" to teach local women how to care for their children prior to the American Civil War. Then in 1868 Jarvis organized "Mothers' Friendship Day," at which mothers gathered with former Union and Confederate soldiers to promote reconciliation and bridge the divide among the American people. I'd say this was an action to establish peace.

Then, in 1870, an abolitionist and suffragette Julia Ward Howe, wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation," a call to action that asked mothers to unite in promoting world peace. In 1873 Howe campaigned for a "Mother's Peace Day" to be celebrated every June 2.

Other early Mother's Day pioneers include Juliet Calhoun Blakely, a temperance activist who inspired a local Mother's Day in Albion, Michigan, in the 1870s. The duo of Mary Towles Sasseen and Frank Hering, meanwhile worked to organize a Mothers' Day in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Some have even called Hering "the Father of Mothers' Day."

Following her mother's death in 1905, Anna Jarvis conceived of Mother's Day as a way of honoring the sacrifices mothers make for their children, including during war. After gaining financial backing from a Philadelphia department store owner, John Wanamaker, in May 1908 she organized the first official Mother's Day celebration at a Methodist church in Grafton, West Virginia. That same day also saw thousands of people attend a Mother's Day event at one of Wanamaker's retail stores in Philadelphia. After an extensive campaign Anna in 1914 succeeded in having President Woodrow Wilson officially establish the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. But the official day slid further and further into commercialization and lost sight of the purpose of this day, the original plan to reject the results of war and violence and to honour the sacrifices made by Mothers everywhere as they call for peace and social justice. Anna Jarvis campaigned against this desecration but the commercialization continued (Continued next column)

to become one of the most profitable days of the year for florists and restaurants and gift shops.

But, there are still some of us who keep to the original plan. There are regions in this world that gather for peace and social justice and equal rights for women and girls and all humanity and creation. One such event has been ongoing in the Kootenay, Boundary, Okanagan at the Canada/USA border. Peace, Social Justice, Environmental and Human Rights groups meet in the nonaligned green space at the Oroville and Osoyoos border. Together we commit each year to continue the struggle to put an end to war, to put an end to all violence and fear and injustice, to create a world of peaceful living in harmony with all Creation. We have been walking and talking and singing and dancing and calling for a better world for about 40 years and will continue to do so not only on Mothers' Day but every day of every week of every year until we can live as one global family sharing with and loving each other. That was the dream of Ann Reeves Jarvis, Julia Ward Howe and Anna Jarvis.

When you gather or talk with family and friends, please do talk about the need for a truly peaceful world immersed in love, kindness, compassion, integrity, dignity and honour. We urge you to make a commitment to create that world, that universe where we can and will live as one global family using non-violent means to do so.

Sadly, due to Covid-19, we were unable to meet in person in 2020 and not in 2021 either. We did meet virtually in 2020 and will do so again in 2021. On Mother's Day, May 9, 2021 starting at 2 pm PDT join us for a virtual gathering. Mothers' Day Proclamation: Julia Ward Howe, Boston, 1870

Arise, then, women of this day! Arise all women who have hearts, whether our baptism be that of water or of fears!

Say firmly: "We will not have great questions decided by irrelevant agencies. Our husbands shall not come to us, reeking with carnage, for caresses and applause. Our sons shall not be taken from us to unlearn all that we have been able to teach them of charity, mercy and patience.

We women of one country will be too tender of those of another country to allow our sons to be trained to injure theirs. From the bosom of the devastated earth a voice goes up with our own. It says "Disarm, Disarm! The sword of murder is not the balance of justice."

Blood does not wipe our dishonour nor violence indicate possession. As men have often forsaken the plow and the anvil at the summons of war, let women now leave all that may be left of home for a great and earnest day of counsel. Let them meet first, as women, to bewail and commemorate the dead.

Let them then solemnly take counsel with each other as to the means whereby the great human family can live in peace, each bearing after their own time the sacred impress, not of Caesar, but of God.

In the name of womanhood and of humanity, I earnestly ask that a general congress of women without limit of nationality may be appointed and held at some place deemed most convenient and at the earliest period consistent with its objects, to promote the alliance of the different nationalities, the amicable settlement of international questions, the great and general interests of peace.

Nestlé sells water business to Wall St

This week's news that Nestlé is selling its bottled water interests in Canada is a capitalistic déjà vu for communities that have been fighting the bottled water giant for decades.

The new owners will be private equity firms One Rock Capital Partners and Metropoulos & Co, who have paid Nestlé U.S. \$4.3 billion for several bottled water brands in the U.S. as well as the "Pure Life" brand bottled near Guelph, Ontario and in Hope, B.C.

Council of Canadians supporters will remember that Nestlé tried to sell its Canadian bottled water business to Ice River Springs Corp last summer, but the deal was cancelled while awaiting Competition Bureau approval. Nestlé's bottled water sales have been decreasing for years as more and more people make the switch back to tap water.

The Nestlé sale comes on the heels of recent disturbing news that Wall Street has begun trading water futures – treating water like any other commodity. The creation of the water futures market is a direct response to water scarcity issues in the U.S. related to overuse and climate change.

While Nestlé waits for its mega-deal to finalize, it will continue pumping out millions of litres of precious groundwater every day on expired permits in Ontario, putting our shared public resource in hundreds of millions of single use plastic bottles for sale at obscene profit.

Council of Canadians supporters like you have fought hard to stop Nestlé's water profiteering. Tens of thousands of people joined a boycott on Nestlé's products, demanded better regulations, and engaged in conversations about water commodification and why we must keep water public and protected.

Groundwater resources are finite. Droughts, climate change and over-extraction continue to impact our limited water sources. Water is a human right, commons and a public trust, to be shared, protected, carefully managed and enjoyed by all who live around it – not a source of profit. (Continued next column)

We know that Nestlé's departure will not end bottled water takings in Canada, and our work continues to oppose any commodification of water for profit.

No to fighter jets with so many other pressing needs, nun savs

By: Micheal Swan From: The Catholic Register April 1, 2021 As deficits skyrocket and Canada's debt-to-GDP ratios teeter on the brink, Sr. Mary Ellen Francoeur has a plan to save the government billions.

The government can easily save itself \$19 billion by simply not replacing its 30-year-old fighter jets, she said.

"How can you in conscience be spending \$19 billion just to buy the jets?" she asks. "Let alone the full life-cycle costs, which our coalition has researched and would come to \$76.8 billion. How can the government in conscience spend that amount of money when so much is needed to maintain life, to care for the health of people, to care for the homeless, to put into education — all the things that have been suffering for so long?"

Francoeur's conscience tells her it's simply wrong, and she's willing to publicly fast for a day or two to make the point.


Francoeur represents Pax Christi Toronto as part of the No New Fighter Jets Coalition, which is staging public fasts and candle-lit vigils from coast to coast April 10 and 11.

It's not just a matter of money for Francoeur. That Canada would need to cement its standing in the world with the capability of bombing people and vital infrastructure anywhere across the globe just doesn't line up with her lifelong commitment to a non-violent Jesus. A 73-year-old retired psychologist and Sister of Service, Francoeur is part of Pax Christi International's Catholic Non-Violence Initiative, supported by Pope Francis.

"Jesus turns to the disciple and says, 'Put your sword away.' Jesus' whole life, really, was a life of non-violence," said Francoeur.

Francoeur cannot square new jets with the federal government's claim to champion a "feminist foreign policy."

"Any feminist foreign policy would be non-violent," she said. "It would be using the powers of dialogue and diplomacy and conflict resolution — negotiation."

Canada is currently in stage three of a five-phase plan to acquire new fighter jets. The current CF-18 fleet is over 30 years old and has been reduced from 138 jets to just 76 aircraft. The government projects that a contract will be awarded for one of three jets — the nuclear-capable Lockheed-Martin F35, the Boeing Super Hornet or the Saab Gripen — early in 2022.

In the meantime the government is also spending \$862.3 million to buy used Australian Hornets, which Ottawa hopes to have fully operational by December 2022.
